# Cite or site?

The words *site* and *cite* are easily confused because they are pronounced the same way. However, their meanings are quite different.

*Site* can be a noun or a verb. As a noun, it refers to a spatial location or an Internet address.<sup>1</sup>

## Examples:

The surgeon removed the stitches from the surgical site one week after the procedure. My favorite Internet site provides excellent coverage of international science news.



When *site* is used as a verb, it

means to locate or to place something into position.<sup>1</sup>

# Example:

The institution sited the new proton therapy center as near as possible to the main hospital.

*Cite* is a verb. When you cite a source, you are quoting it or calling it to someone's attention as a precedent, proof, or example.<sup>2</sup>

## Example:

In our manuscript, we cited eight recent studies on the impact of exercise in patients with metastatic lung cancer.

In reference lists, you may *cite* an Internet *site*.
